Maine's bright identity


Maine has always been appreciated for its sublime natural beauty, strong community spirit, rugged identity, and pragmatic sensibilities.

In recent years, Maine has become increasingly attractive to both younger people exploring the State's promise and also to former Mainers eager to "come home."







As an apprentice-like lab, MFI will provide multidisciplinary **experiential learning** for students by working on scale directly with Maine businesses, State and municipal officials, higher-ed peers as well as NGO leaders on topics and issues relative to collaborating on Maine's best future.

Faculty

In turn, classroom teaching and faculty **research will have a wider platform** in which to share findings, with MFI serving as a proactive "broker/agent" on behalf of faculty and staff.



Alumni

Uniquely, MFI will also serve as an active funnel for **alumni to engage with the College through their expertise**, networks and support in directly addressing ideas and actions supporting Maine's best future: a keen interest for many alumni.

MFI builds on Bowdoin's strengths to:

- Deliver hands-on, immersive experiences for students through real-world projects, across the whole student body
- Augment the focus on applied research in ways which directly impact Maine's communities and industries
- Foster alumni engagement as an ongoing resource for broader learning, investment, and consistent collaborations
- Serve as a catalytic platform for new ideas, partnerships, and models of civic leadership



Examples of MFI Programming

MFI will provide a structured platform for collaboration through:

- Quarterly leadership workshops/hackathons/labs –
 Convening business, government, and nonprofit leaders generating specific actions against Maine's challenges
- Ongoing state-wide consortia Bringing together key stakeholders to share knowledge and coordinate efforts
- Policy briefings for elected officials Translating faculty research into actionable recommendations
- Student and faculty fieldwork stipends Funding travel and projects that engage directly with Maine communities





Staffing | Deliverables | Funding



- \$6.5M endowment, fully drawn down over 10 years
- Lean organizational model: Executive Director + 2 core FTE, fully supplemented by fractional consultants, as needed
- Utilizes existing campus infrastructure minor office use, event venues, IT backdrop, digital platforms, existing programs, etc. to minimize overhead
- Flexible targeted fellowships & stipends supporting student and faculty engagement, Statewide. Additional channel lanes to be designed for alumni and parents
- A force-multiplier for Bowdoin's network leverage, applied measurements connected to experiential learning, brand-equity confirmed.....all on behalf of Maine.
